COURSES TAUGHT

- Maritime Studies 489: Special Topics
- o Special Topic: Rhetorics of the Internet
 - Advanced undergraduate course focusing on using theoretical frameworks from digital rhetoric and classical rhetoric to investigate the ways in which we, as simultaneous internet creators and audiences, are rhetorically situated in connection with the algorithms, social media environments, and digital tools that shape our communication strategies in various internet spaces.

- Maritime Studies 485: Directed Study
 - o Special Topic: Exploring Law through Classical Rhetoric
 - Directed study course focusing on developing student awareness of the relationships between classical rhetoric—particularly Aristotelian ethics and Ciceronian invention—and contemporary legal studies and movements.
- English 203: Writing about Literature
 - o Special Topic: Literary Horror
 - Literary writing course focusing on acclimating students to genre conventions, theories, and critical skills necessary to identify and analyze significant works of literature with a special focus on the manifestation of horror across literary texts.
- English 104: Composition and Rhetoric
 - First-year writing course focusing on the development of students' writing processes
 through building skills such as critical reading, analytical writing, and research.
 Course also cultivates rhetorical awareness through engagement with campus
 Common Reader text and corresponding Culture Discourse attribute.
- English 210: Technical and Professional Writing Online
 - O Professional writing course focusing on applying student knowledge of rhetorical situation to workplace writing and procedural documents through assignments focused on traditional workplace genres, from corporate press releases to instructional guides to collaborative workplace project proposals. Course facilitated in an online format.
- English R209: Topics in Rhetoric and Public Culture
 - o Special Topic: Canceled! Cancel Culture and the Ancient Rhetorical Canons
 - Rhetoric and public culture course focusing on reading the contemporary cases of cancel culture through the lens of the ancient rhetorical canons (invention, arrangement, style, memory, and delivery). Students critically analyzed both ancient and contemporary examples ranging from Plato and Cicero to political Twitter accounts in order to study the rhetorical nature of cancelation.
- English W231: Professional Writing Skills
 - O Professional writing course focusing on developing writing skills needed in a professional environment. The course emphasized effective document design, reading job advertisements, and positioning a variety of materials, from resumes and cover letters to project proposals and reports, rhetorically.
- English W131 Multilingual: Analytical Reading, Writing, & Inquiry
 - First-year writing course specially tailored to and focusing on the unique language needs of multilingual students. Students learn to read and analyze a variety of texts such as essays, multimodal advertisements, and photographs. The theme of this course considered the rhetorical nature writing genres with special emphasis on translingual texts and codemeshing.

- English W131: Analytical Reading, Writing, & Inquiry
 - O First-year writing course focusing on building analytical skills in reading and writing. Students analyzed texts that ranged from essays to films to music videos. The theme of this course is centered on linguistic violence and othering.
